## **Building Hope**

For Kuyper graduate Bill Moerdyk, who recently celebrated 21 years with Habitat for Humanity of Kent County, work and service are inseparable.

He is excited to wake up in the morning and head to the jobsite, he said, because he knows he is doing more than simply earning a paycheck. When he raises a roof, lays down siding or sculpts the yard of a Habitat house, he is giving those he serves a fresh start in life through safe, comfortable housing.

"My work is rewarding because it's about giving back to others," he said recently, leaning back in a rocking chair next to his wife, Cheryl, whom he married in 1979. "It's been a dream job from the beginning."

Moerdyk took his first construction job in 1977, the summer after graduating from Loy Norrix High School in Kalamazoo, Michigan. What began as a temporary position on his uncle's crew, he said, eventually grew into his life's calling.

"At the end of the summer, there wasn't enough work for him to keep me on anymore," he recalled. "So, I went down to the local lumber yard and asked if they

## Embracing Community, Beginning a New Year

Kuyper College began the new academic year with a focus on "A Life of Service" and an encouragement to emulate Jesus' life of humility and sacrificial love.

That focus was woven throughout a series of festivities to begin the new school year. At opening Convocation, held the first day of classes, President Patricia Harris tied the theme for the year into Kuyper's newly refreshed mission statement, and she reminded those gathered in Vos Chapel that, "As a community of biblical higher education, Kuyper College forms lifelong learners for purposeful lives of work and service to God and neighbor."

She added: "My hope is that Kuyper College will be a meaningful community for all of us, where we can learn, work and serve together," she said.

And while classes started the day after Labor Day, students got a full immersion into Kuyper's culture and ethos the week prior during orientation, three days marked by excitement, eagerness, laughter and love.

At Move-In Day, teams of Kuyper professors, staff and returning students were ready to put servant leadership into practice by welcoming newcomers and their families to campus with a smile. Many familiar Kuyper faces, including President Harris and Director of Admissions Kris Haymon, lent a helping hand as students settled into their new homes in Schaal and Timmer halls.

The move-in teams were needed as this fall's first-year class is one of the largest in recent years at 60-plus students and with transfers added in, some 70-plus students were on campus for orientation week.

The new arrivals represent five countries-Andorra, India, Kenya, Spain and the U.S.—and seven states— Alabama, California, Indiana, Michigan, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Pennsylvania. Many of them will also be student-

athletes with admissions stats showing two-thirds of the first-year students currently plan to play a sport at Kuyper.

After move-in, it was time for an afternoon dedication service in the Vos Chapel, which set the tone for the new year by calling the community to live lives marked by faith-driven servant leadership.

It was also an opportunity to formally welcome new students to Kuyper.

"You stepping into this community will make it even brighter and help us flourish even more," President Harris told the first-year class with a smile. "Welcome to Kuyper College. We so appreciate having you here!"

Emily Karsten is one of the newest members of the Kuyper community. She began her time at the College as a dually enrolled high school student and is looking forward to full-time studies.

"When I heard about Kuyper from my brother, who is an upperclassman here, I knew I just had to come," she said. "I've loved the experiences I've had here so far, and I can't wait for more."

Following the dedication service, an all-student welcome took place. The festivities continued the next day with worship, community conversations, orientation to Kuyper's Work College approach (it is the only Work College in Michigan) and sessions on academic and spiritual development.

The three days of activities wrapped up with worship, team challenges, discussions and an ice cream social.

knew of anyone who was looking for workers, because that's what you did in those days."

He spent the next few years working for other contractors, learning more tricks of the trade.

Then, God presented a new path to follow.

## Engaged in mission-centered work

He and Cheryl had felt God calling them to the mission field for some time. They had already begun pursuing an opportunity to serve in Haiti and were even learning to speak Creole when his brother, who was a missionary in Nigeria, told them of an opening with his organization.

"He worked as an agriculturalist with a Dutch mission organization, and they were looking for a builder," he said.

The Moerdyks served in Nigeria from 1984 to 1994, welcoming three of their eight children during that time. During those years, Moerdyk said, he cultivated a strong sense of what it means to make an impact at the community level by engaging in mission-centered work. After returning home, he simply couldn't imagine doing anything else.

At first, he thought this meant God was calling him to be a pastor. Knowing that Kuyper College could help him build a strong foundation of biblical and theological knowledge—while also

gaining the experience necessary to follow this call—he decided to enroll.

Though he was a fair bit older than his fellow students, he said he fit right in.

"I graduated high school the year before most of my classmates were born," he said with a laugh. "But I enjoyed the good fellowship I got to have with them." And the flexibility Kuyper offered made it the ideal place for the father of a growing family, who also continued working in construction full time to continue his education.

"I was able to have mostly 8 a.m. classes," he said. "I could get to work afterward and still make it home for supper and family evening time."

Though he began his time at Kuyper with the intention of becoming a pastor, by the time he was finished, Moerdyk had begun to question whether this was really the path God had laid out for him.

#### A long legacy at Habitat

After graduating in 1998, he says he wasn't sure where to go next. He created his own construction company, and a few years later, he contacted Habitat Kent, looking for ways to involve his church's youth group in serving the community. On a whim, he decided to ask about a job for himself too.

"They said no at first, but I got a call two weeks later, encouraging me to submit my resume for a new position that had just been created," he said. "The problem was, I didn't have one. In the building world, you get work mostly by word of mouth. So, I went back to Kuyper for help."

He smiled as he recalled the Kuyper staff who happily offered their assistance, helping him craft the resume that eventually brought him to Habitat.

Moerdyk's legacy with Habitat Kent spans statewide. Since joining the team in 2001, he has served in a variety of roles, most recently as senior site supervisor. He founded the Homes Summit, where construction employees from all of Michigan's Habitat affiliates gather annually to share building strategies and learn what's new on the market. He has also led Habitat Kent's Brush of Kindness event, where, in just three days, Habitat

Kent and 250 AmeriCorps volunteers improved 14 homes on a single street.

He enjoys empowering his volunteers by teaching them new skills, seeing them complete tasks they previously didn't feel equipped to do.

"My most satisfying days are setting trusses with a group of volunteers who have never done that before," he said. "They're just blown away when they see a box become a home."

But, he added, the best part of his work is connecting with the families who will one day live in the homes he builds. Each one has their own unique story, and he is grateful to walk alongside them on their homeownership journeys.

Moerdyk came to Habitat Kent when they had just begun building their 100th house. By the end of the summer of 2023, he had helped complete the 500th, on the very same street where the first had been built.

He smiles when he thinks about this, seeing both the humor and the providence. Every new build and rehab he has participated in represents an individual or family who received new hope in the form of a home to call their own. And God, he said, has been there all along, guiding and equipping him.

His work has always been more than just a job to him, he said, and as the waning light of sunset streams through his own front window, Moerdyk said simply: "We are a witness not only to the families we serve, but to each other and to the neighborhoods we work in."

## New Minors to Open Valuable Academic Avenues

A pair of new minors will give Kuyper students excellent academic options to



combine with their major and will enhance their career after graduation.

The sports management minor will be led by business leadership professor Marc Andreas who

said the reintroduction of varsity athletics to the College also is leading to a surge of new student athletes interested in the field.

"We are creating a minor that fits the culture

of Kuyper College," Andreas said.

The community development minor also is a natural fit with Kuyper's history and mission and recognizes that many churches are working to become more engaged with their local communities. It will overlap with content from the Kuyper social work major while allowing students interested in community development to gain a deeper knowledge of the field.

Social work program director Jennifer Colin came to the College two years ago after many years in K-12 education, including stints as a school social worker, school counselor and principal.

She said Kuyper students have expressed interest in learning more about how they



can care for and grow their communities in a more intentional way.

"Offering the community development minor can effectively equip students with knowledge and

tools that will help them make a difference wherever God leads," she said. "Community development empowers people to utilize their own gifts and talents in creating an environment where everyone can flourish."
