

s Gary Bailey walks, and talks, a visitor through the sparkling new athletic suite at Kuyper College, it's not so much pride in his voice as it is quiet satisfaction.

"I'm very grateful for this space," the Kuyper men's basketball coach and athletic director said, lightly running his hand along a Kuyper-gold textured wall. "A year ago, I was painting these walls."

Giving the floor a gentle nudge with his sneakered right foot he added with a hearty chuckle: "And I was laying this carpet."

Now, as the first year of the return of Kuyper athletics has come to a close, Bailey and his team of coaches are continuing to lay foundations for the future, gratefully building on what by all accounts was a terrific season of success in 2023-24.

And though wins were plentiful this past school year—with women's basketball setting a new Kuyper record for wins at 16-10 and the men's basketball team matching the school record for wins at 20-9—Ws are not what Bailey first mentions when asked about what made the return of athletics a success.

"As far as successes go, I think anytime that you start a new program, you're always worried about numbers for your team," he said. "Can you get not just enough players, but can you get the right players, the ones who are a fit for what it

In this issue you'll read about students, staff, coaches and faculty who are living out our mission, day in and day out. And at the recent Spring Gala we presented Dr. Nick and Rev. Gloria Kroeze with the Kuyper College Service Award for their lives of service to the mission of the College.

There are countless other stories of those within our College community who are living out our mission, including one alumnus who recently drove his food truck two hours to serve scores of emergency personnel,



volunteers and victims after a massive tornado hit Shelby County, Iowa.

### A Life of Service

The theme for the 2023-24 academic year was "A Life of Service," and that theme was at the forefront for two special events in April: first the annual Kuyper Gala and then the College's spring Commencement ceremony.

Speakers at both events gave powerful words of wisdom and advice to those gathered in the two venues—Frederik Meijer Gardens and Sculpture Park for the Gala and the Boonstra Gymnasium on Kuyper's campus for graduation.

At the latter, Kuyper graduate Mandi Taylor told the Class of 2024, and the friends and family members who came to fete them, that while the world often tells young people to follow their dreams, sometimes those dreams and God's plan don't align. This, she added, she knows from experience.

"I am nowhere near where I envisioned myself being when I was in high school," she said, smiling. "But God put in my path better opportunities than I ever dreamt possible."

That path saw her attend several colleges after high school but ultimately buy a business on Mackinac Island. She eventually felt a calling to social work and graduated from Kuyper in 2018 with a degree in the field before earning a master's degree from Spring Arbor University in 2022 and then landing a job at Bethany Christian Services as the Parenting Supports Supervisor in the Foster Care Department.

Along the way, she said, she learned that serving others is a big part of following God's direction.

### 'The reality of our mission'

Dr. Patricia Harris, Kuyper's President, echoed this sentiment in her words of welcome to Commencement attendees. "These graduates are the reality of our mission," she said. "They are being formed as lifelong learners for purposeful lives of work and service to God and neighbor, and we are so thankful for that," she said.

Abby Brown, who graduated in 2024 with a degree in social work, is one of those learners and spoke on behalf of her class.

"We are not leaving, we are being sent," she said. "May we remember the lessons that we learned here, to be quick to serve and open our arms wide to embrace others, even if they do not look or think like us. And may we constantly remind ourselves of the source of this love: Christ."

#### An 85-year track record

At the Gala, Dr. Anthony Bradley presented a seemingly simple statement to students, staff, faculty and friends of the College that foreshadowed the themes of Commencement.

Looking around the room, he said: "What if I told you there was a college that wasn't merely giving lip service to its Christian mission but was actually living it, day in and day out."

The College, of course, is Kuyper, and Bradley, keynote speaker for the night and Kuyper's Research Professor of Interdisciplinary and Theological Studies, knows that full well. As he neared the end of his first year at the College, Bradley told those gathered to celebrate that Kuyper has an 85-year track record of living out its mission in deep and tangible ways.

Another important part of the Gala was the presentation of the Kuyper Service Award, which is given each year to a recipient or recipients who have exhibited the spirit and work of the College's mission statement through lifelong service.

"By accepting this award, the recipients set an example of dedication and humility in service that encourages all of us within the Kuyper College community," remarked President Harris, who conferred the honors.

This year, the Kuyper Service Award was presented to Dr. Nicholas and Rev. Gloria Kroeze who, during Dr. Kroeze's 22 years as President of Kuyper College and beyond, have truly lived lives of faithful service.

"I, along with Nick, thank you for the honor of this award. I have had the great privilege of doing this life journey with him, and it's been amazing," Rev. Kroeze said.

Added Dr. Kroeze: "We receive this award. not so much as an affirmation of anything we have done, but as an additional prayer reminder for us to embrace even more strongly the mission and people of Kuyper College, that God may bless her and strengthen her toward the future."

means to be a Kuyper student-athlete? We needed our coaches to be recruiters, and they got the job done."

Beyond that, Bailey added, was the concept of community.

"It's a Kuyper hallmark," he said. "We talk about community here being real and deep and happening inside and outside the classroom. Well, we saw it happen through athletics this past school year."

With a laugh, Bailey noted that the College had to reorder Kuyper Cougars T-shirts and sweatshirts probably a dozen times.

"And I've seen people wearing them out in the community that I don't even know," he said. "It is really cool. But maybe one of the biggest things was that at all of our events we had so much support. Fellow students, staff, faculty, alumni. For so many games, the gym was packed. Those were real successes."

Kuyper President Patricia Harris heartily agrees.

"Gary Bailey and his coaching staff did an amazing job of launching and leading our athletic program this past year, and the outcomes far exceed my expectations," she said. "And they are dedicated to building and maintaining a vibrant, Godhonoring culture. I thoroughly enjoyed the enthusiastic engagement and success of athletics on our campus this year and look forward to what next year brings." Bailey is looking forward to 2024-25 too, eager for women's volleyball and men's and women's basketball to build on what was begun this past year and excited about adding men's soccer to the fall lineup of sports.

"Athletics allows us as a college to invite people in," he said. "This campus is so beautiful, and it's got such a great location. I don't know that we've tapped into the full potential here in terms of bringing people in, but as we add more sports, we add more opportunities to connect people to all of the good things happening at Kuyper. So that is very exciting to me, to our coaches and to our players."

Count men's soccer coach Mike Colago among those who can't wait for

"We have been hitting the recruiting trail hard, and we have been hosting open gyms and watching

guys play," Colago said. "You can tell a lot from a player when they walk in the gym and start competing and interacting with others.

Colago's sales pitch to prospective student-athletes is simple.

"As a newcomer into the Kuyper community, there was always such a welcoming and warm atmosphere here," she said. "The addition of athletics only furthered that supportive

community and allowed us all to rally around our students in a really exciting way. My hope for the future of Kuyper volleyball is that we will continue to support and uplift our athletes to their fullest potential, both on and off the court."

As Bailey considers the future, including the College possibly adding more sports, like his coaches, he remains eager to see continuous improvement in Kuyper athletics.

"We made some needed physical improvements to the facilities," he said. "Redoing the gym floor, new bleachers, new shot clocks, upgrading a lot of little things like the training room. You know, maybe things that people don't always think about."

He laughed as he recalled some of the scrambling he and his team had to do ahead of the first games for volleyball last fall.

"When we were getting ready (for volleyball season), we realized we didn't have water jugs

Off the court, two players earned academic accolades. Maria Sobany and Couper Agema both were named National Christian College Athletic Association Scholar-Athletes, an award based on grade point average and academic credits.

Three players and Coach Gary Bailey collected individual hardware. Elisha Searcy was All-Region second team, while Herman Brown and Danyel Bibbs were both All-Region first team with Bibbs also being named the Regional Player of the Year and a member of the All-American second team. Meanwhile, Bailey was named Regional Coach of the Year, his 10th time winning the award with the prior nine coming during his tenure as the head coach at Grace Christian University. And the men's basketball team finished in 10th place in the final NCCAA coaches' poll of the 2023-24 season.

### In My Words

#### A PASSION FOR KUYPER

My first encounter with Kuyper came as a local homeschooled student. I visited campus with my mom as a high school senior. By the time we left, I was 100 percent committed to attending and never looked elsewhere. I was

completely drawn in by both the size of the College and by its appeal as a safe space to transition to my first experience of classroom learning.

I had an amazing experience as a Kuyper student. I made incredible friends and loved the classes, professors and the active and engaged community, including my involvement on the Student Activities Committee as a student leader. I also met Curt my sophomore year, and we dated for three-and-a-half years before getting married in 2005.

I remember that when my mom and I left our campus visit, she said to me, in reference to the director of admissions, who we had met, "You need to do that job someday." Then, during my first year

of study at Kuyper, I was approached by the then director of admissions to work in the office as a student worker!

In the beginning, I did mostly mailings and a lot of phone call campaigns, but I loved working in the Admissions Office. I continued to work there my entire time as a student and even was full time in the summer months. That work was a life-changing experience for me. I had begun my studies at Kuyper thinking I wanted to become a teacher and quickly realized that was not where God was calling me. I briefly thought about youth ministry but also didn't feel called there. Eventually, I realized that my passion was working in admissions and helping other prospective students find their place at Kuyper.

During my junior year of studies at Kuyper, a full-time admissions counselor position opened, and I engaged in conversations about what it would look like for me to take the position. I was offered the position in 2005 with the agreement that I would switch to part- time classes while doing full-time work. As a result, it took me an extra year to complete my education, and I graduated in 2006. I then continued to work in admissions until 2010 when I left to have my first son.

I loved being a stay-at-home mom, raising our three boys, and I never really intended to return to work, but God had other plans! In December 2021, He opened the door for me to return to the Admissions office in what I thought was to be a short-term position. My passion for sharing Kuyper with prospective students and being a part of the community was ignited, and I stayed and grew in leadership.

God has been faithful to Kuyper College for the past 85 years, and I am grateful to have been a part of the story here for over 20 of those years as a student, staff member, staff spouse and now a staff member again. It is a joy to be on the front lines of continuing the work God is doing here!

## Kuyper Partners with GRIL

It was while coaching basketball at Potter's House High School that Kuyper business leadership professor Marc Andreas first got a chance to see the impact of a faith-based organization called Grand Rapids Initiative for Leaders or GRIL.

Created by alumni of the DeVos Urban Leadership Initiative in 2004, GRIL offers a variety of leadership development programs, and Andreas saw the difference GRIL was making in the lives of some of his players in the areas of not just leadership but also community development and their own personal maturation process.

"I looked more into their curriculum and saw that it aligned with Kuyper's values," he recalled. "I wanted to find a way to bring this wonderful opportunity to even more young people."

Working with Denise Fase, the longtime director at GRIL, saw the development of a new course called "Leadership, Empowerment and Community Development" that was offered this semester to Kuyper students for the first time ever.

Andreas said the course, which was taught by Fase, has been a good fit for the Kuyper curriculum.

"As a three-credit course, it nicely fits with students who want to get Kuyper's new 15-credit minor in Christian Community Development," he said. "It's also an excellent course for students from all majors as an elective to help them explore their own personal leadership skills while

seeing how they can make a positive impact integrating into their own community as well."

And early reviews of this first offering were terrific, he added.

"I've heard students say they love this course because it helps open up their eyes to a larger view of opportunities they can do to get more involved in their very own communities," he said. "It helps empower young people to move from being observers to active participants in their communities to work for justice and positive change that aligns with biblical values."

### Dr. Richelle White Earns Grant

For Dr. Richelle White, Kuyper Professor of Youth Ministry and Director of Field Practicum and Internships, storytelling plays a big role in both her

teaching and her academic work. Telling our stories, she said, is a crucial part of building community and working toward spiritual, physical and collective healing.

Storytelling, community and healing are also the central themes of a new research project for which she recently received a grant from the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship.

Over the next year, White, who earned her Ph.D. at Union Presbyterian Seminary, will work with 12 women from various walks of life—Kuyper students and alumni as well as members of Grace for the Nations Church—to create a storytelling lab.

"It's an intergenerational group. Our oldest member is 82, and our youngest is 20. Everybody brings something to the table," she said.

The group will gather twice a month, once a virtual writing circle and once an in-person workshop, to build community and experience healing by exploring and sharing personal narratives.

Through this deep dive into storytelling, White hopes to enhance her professional knowledge and benefit her students.

"I'm always trying to include more storytelling activities in my teaching. Sometimes it's me or my students telling the stories, and sometimes we're engaging with stories from movies or other media," she said. "I want them to be aware of what stories do and of the power that stories have."

Enhancing her teaching skills, she says, is at the heart of why she applied for the Calvin grant in the first place.

"I always like to feed my interests and passions so I can keep things fresh here," she said.

She plans to complete the project by December 2024.
